Bonfire advice, disposing of garden waste

A bonfire can be a convenient way of getting rid of a large amount of waste. However, there may be other options which are better for the environment and your garden.

The following are recommended alternatives to a bonfire:

- Composting soft garden waste such as grass cuttings and leaves is the best means of disposal as it returns nutrients to the soil.
- Woody garden waste cannot be easily composted so may be disposed of by cutting relatively short and packing into your green wheelie bin.
- Large amounts of household and garden waste can be taken to a local household waste and recycling centre. Alternatively consider hiring a skip from a private company. If you would need to place the

skip on the road or pavement rather than in your garden, then you need to obtain a licence from Buckinghamshire County Council.

Additionally, Aylesbury Vale District Council's Waste Team can collect bulky items of household refuse, e.g. old furniture, mattresses & floor coverings. Further details at:<u>www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk/bulky-item-collection</u>.

However if you decide to have a bonfire we advise you to follow these guidelines to reduce the likelihood of causing a problem:

- DO advise your nearest neighbours' before you light a bonfire so they can be prepared for any minor inconvenience that may arise.
- DO choose the time of day and weather conditions that will cause the least inconvenience to neighbours and passing motorists. Having a bonfire on a warm day or evening when people want to enjoy their garden and tend to have doors and windows open will cause greater annoyance.
- DO burn material quickly in small quantities so the minimum amount of smoke is created.
- DO be aware of where the smoke is likely to travel, consider your neighbours' and roads.
- DO choose your bonfire site carefully, well away from trees, boundary fences and windows.
- DO NOT burn wet or green garden waste. This will create heavy smoke. Allow clippings to dry and turn brown for a couple of weeks before burning.
- DO NOT burn any oily rags, rubber, plastics or other materials that will create heavy smoke or toxic fumes.
- DO NOT light a bonfire when your neighbours' have washing drying, or are out enjoying their gardens or have windows wide open.
- NEVER leave a fire unattended

Beware of lighting bonfires when there are unstable weather conditions, for example on very windy days it can so easily get out of control. Have a hose pipe and buckets of water handy just in case. Hose it down until cold before you leave and then rake the ashes into the soil as a useful fertiliser and prevent them being blown onto your neighbours' property.

Garden waste service: Arrange a garden waste collection for one annual payment of £45, payable by direct debit, and save a trip to the tip! For more details visit: www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk/garden-waste-service

Leaf Blowers: Please consider those around you before rounding up your dead leaves with a leaf blower, which can cause a considerable noise nuisance.

Weedkillers containing Glyphosate: It has been brought to our attention that herbicides that contain Glyphosate are damaging to the environment and 'probably carcinogenic to humans'.

Litter picking: You may have noticed the increase in litter left on the verges in the parish recently, especially visible since the verges have been cut back.

The proposed date for the next organised litter pick for the three villages is SUNDAY 23rd September. The Village Hall will be open as our base from 1pm, with light refreshments provided. Please let me know if you would like to be involved if you haven't done this before. I will notify all the usual volunteers in the near future. If you are not free on that Sunday, another time can be arranged. I will agree a route with you and provide risk assessment, hi-viz jacket, litterpicker, bags etc as needed. You will need gloves and suitable footwear. I will arrange for the bags to be collected by AVDC. Any flytipping is reported separately.

d) Judges take into account that outting of grass verges outside the settlement is usually the principal authority's responsibility.

Judges' comments

VILLAGE/TOWN: Mentmore

The outstanding feature of Mentmore has to be its Village Green, which appeared excellently managed at the time of our visit.

The Stag's forecourt is serviceable and litter free, as are the Village Hall surrounds. The notice board was up to date and showed evidence of ongoing communal activites.

Perhaps because of its difficult access and awkward topography, the churchyard appeared somewhat substandard as regards upkeep, though it was clear that some maintenance had taken place. The war memorial was reasonably well looked after.

Mentmore is a quiet and tidy village with little or no litter to be seen. This in itself shows good evidence of community spirit.

MOVING FORWARD:

We should use the information gained to help us tackle problem areas within the village so that, not only will we be able to improve the look of our village now, but we will stand a better chance of winning in the future!

So, if you want to help improve our parish why not make a start by getting involved in the next litter pick or volunteer to help look after the churchyard – it all makes a difference and will benefit everyone!

FOOTPATHS to RECIPES

Liz has now completed her "Parish Footpaths" feature having walked, and reported on, all of the parish's footpaths over the past couple of years, so we thought we would include something a little different in this issue – one of Liz's favourite recipes!

SWEET TOMATO AND CHILLI RELISH

Makes about 500ml

1kg vine tomatoes1 tsp sea salt200g granulated jam sugar with pectin1 tbsp finely chopped medium-hot red chilli3 garlic cloves, peeled and finely chopped100ml white wine or cider vinegar

Preheat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6 Have ready a large roasting tin or dish about 25cm x 35cm Pierce the top of the tomatoes with the point of a knife, plunge them into boiling water for 20 seconds, then into cold water, slip off the skins and coarsely chop the flesh, discarding the cores.

Combine the chopped tomatoes with all the remaining ingredients in the roasting dish, and place in the oven, uncovered, for 65-75 minutes, stirring towards the end, until reduced considerably, with the tomatoes sitting in a small amount of syrupy juices.

Spoon the mixture into a hot sterilised jar, or jars, cover and leave to cool. Store in the fridge.

We are considering whether to make this a regular feature in the newsletter, but will have to consider all the legal implications such as copyright etc. before we make a final decision.

As many of you will remember a revised version of the Mentmore WI Cookbook was published in 2009. The book contained a variety of recipes from local residents past and present, and (if they can be found amidst all the re-organisation as a result of building works at home) I do still have a few copies! So, for the princely sum of £5 you can find out what your fellow parishioners favourite recipes are – just give me a call or drop me an e-mail.
