We are looking forward very much to the Mentmore Arts Festival again this year; it is a fabulous event and one which I am so glad to see the church used for! (And I am pleased to say my sister is exhibiting this year – see if you can spot her!) As last year, we are hoping to

build upon this cultural event by holding a Christian Creative Arts Retreat - dates are yet to be confirmed.

You may have noticed that the churchyard has been tidied up and some of the shrubs pruned; after many years of neglect it was becoming urgent, and I am grateful to the small team of volunteers, some from Cheddington, who gave their time and energy to the task.

Services continue to be at 9.00 a.m. on Sunday mornings, alternate weeks (1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup>) and I can assure you of a friendly welcome should you come along.

I recently met with the Bishop of Buckingham and during our conversation he showed me a photo of a church in Finchley, London, which has been adapted with children's play area and a cafe. It is quite a "high" church and yet they have accommodated the needs of the local community within its walls for use mid-week. I would love St Mary's to be used regularly to serve the needs of the village. It doesn't have a toilet, or running water, and parking is difficult – but these obstacles can be overcome. It may be that a shop, or post office, a gallery, or exchange of home produce, or something like that, could be set up – making a little money whilst not limiting the building as a functioning, worshipping, church. The small meeting room is available for hire separately as appropriate.



More thanks! This time to those people who made a contribution towards the sturdy new kissing gate now fitted at the top of the field adjacent to Vicarage Cottage in Mentmore. The Parish Council matched the figure donated and the gate has been fitted by volunteers from North Bucks rRipple (ramblers Repairing & Improving Public Paths for Leisure & Exercise). The path down towards Ledburn is now much more accessible, and requests are being received to consider the replacement of other stiles elsewhere in the parish.





because we are now only collecting the more recent detritus but the level of cans and bottles and fast food waste never seems to decrease (with accompanying toilet if you know which ditch to search). #### WALKING THE PARISH FOOTPATHS - MEN 15/2, 15/1, 13/2

The whole of this walk around Crafton will take you about ¾ hour but can be shortened, as described below. There is parking space at the T-junction by the Crafton noticeboard but away from the white gate, which is in use. Walk down the road to the left for about 300 yards. The path (15/2) starts with a kissing gate at the marked public footpath on the right, which you will find shortly after the entrance to a group of barn conversions. Follow it up between the hedgerows for about 400 yards before you arrive at a field. You are requested to keep dogs on leads from this point, to protect crops and wildlife. The field is planted, and as often seems to be the case, it seems logical to skirt round the edge. However, the path goes diagonally across a corner of the field and has been clearly marked with vehicle tracks for your convenience. At the far side of the field, cross over the farm track, with Helsthorpe Farm on your left. Again, it would seem easier here to follow the farm tracks on the other side but bear with it. There is a sign which indicates the way, neither up the track to your left, nor straight on, but diagonally across the field in front of you, towards a line of pylons. The field is planted but the footpath has been marked by a vehicle, as before. Possibly because of historic field boundaries, at a certain point the path suddenly veers to the right towards a nearby pylon in the middle of the field.

Just past this point, you can turn sharp right and shorten your walk by following the path (13/2) over towards the top end of Crafton. As you reach the edge of the field, you will see a stile on the other side of the track. Climb over this (dogs can easily go underneath) and cross another smaller field heading to the left of the houses on the other side of the field. At the time of writing, this path had not yet been marked this year. Walk to the left of the houses, and over a second stile, again easily negotiated by dogs. You are now in Crafton and a short walk down to the bottom of the village will bring you back to your starting point.

Should you wish to go further (15/1), continue on past the pylon in a straight line, going gently downhill towards the Wingrave road, visible a few hundred yards ahead. Halfway there, the path becomes a farm track which brings you right to the road. If you do not wish to walk along the road, there is no alternative but to go back the way you came!

#### **OVER-HEIGHT VEHICLES – LEDBURN**

We are currently looking at possible solutions to better prevent over-height vehicles approaching the bridge and having to reverse back to Ledburn.

In order to gather data on the scope of the problem, can anyone who sees such vehicles please make a simple note of date, time and type of vehicle and send it to clerk@mentmore.org. This will allow us to build a better case should we need to determine the effectiveness of any changes made or if we request better signage.





Our work began in the early part of the year with repairs and, in some cases complete replacement, of damaged boxes in readiness for this year's breeding season. The worst of these was a box that, despite a large hole in the rear panel and roof, had been successfully used by a tawny owl last season. It seems the owls were very lucky, as when we went back to put the new box in place the old one was in pieces on the ground!

While carrying out the repairs we were able to confirm the presence of at least one pair of barn owls in the box they were using last year. We also had another barn owl which flew from its box, but was then found in a second box nearby. This owl was one of last year's chicks, amazingly, as it turned out, ringed by Lynne at a nest in Cholesbury. Unfortunately, some weeks later this bird was handed in to St. Tiggywinkles, slightly malnourished and behaving a little "oddly". I am pleased to report that it is doing well but, due to its "odd" behaviour will probably not be released back into the wild.

Lynne and I began our first round of box checks in early March and had some success regarding box occupation; a tawny owl sitting on two eggs and another box with two resident barn owls, but no eggs. In fact, while bent down beneath the box preparing the ladder, the first of the two owls flew from the box and left a lovely "present" all across the back of my shirt – delightful! We looked at a few other boxes to help get an idea of the timing of this year's breeding season, but given the results took a decision to delay further box checks for several weeks in order to cause as little disturbance as possible to any early nesting birds.

Our second round of box checks were carried out in early May and again we had mixed results. Many of the boxes contained only stock doves and, although not owls, any chicks present were ringed as part of our BTO monitoring. However, on returning to the box in which we had previously found a tawny owl on eggs, we were delighted to find the female with two healthy chicks. We not only ringed the two chicks, but also the adult female (a rarity, as they are difficult to trap, and the first for Lynne in 17 years of ringing!). We had further good news for another of our tawny boxes – a female sitting on two eggs.

Our visits will continue throughout late May and early June to ensure that all boxes and locations are checked. In early to mid-June, weather permitting, we will begin our return visits to those boxes that had adults sitting on eggs – so fingers crossed that we continue to get positive results and healthy chicks.

Please do remember though, that any unlicensed disturbance of these species at or near their nest sites is illegal and can lead to prosecution under the Wildlife & Countryside Act.
