I am pleased to announce that at the Parish Council Meeting held on the 3rd of February 2021, we co-opted Hannah Wrathall onto the council. Welcome Councillor Wrathall.

Hannah fills the vacancy left by the resignation of Liz Dack, who has served the village so well for so long. She always had an eye on a certain birthday as a cut-off point and that birthday is this year.

I cannot thank Liz enough for the time she has served on the PC. Of course she has been involved in serving village life before I moved into Mentmore; I understand she first got involved in the early 80's. So we reached out to Corry Cashman, who was also involved in council duties at that time, and asked him for his thoughts.

My first memory of Liz was at a meeting of Mentmore Parish Council in the early 1980s, at which time she was the parish clerk. The meeting ran smoothly, due in no small measure to Liz's preparation and work. All parish councillors had been provided with the appropriate paperwork and necessary briefings. When questions arose on particular agenda items Liz provided answers. Where it might be helpful she would tactfully volunteer further information. At appropriate moments she reminded the councillors of the limits to the council's powers. While it was a formal meeting, it was conducted in a friendly, respectful and inclusive way. That first meeting, to my recollection, considered a number of agenda items, from planning applications to the potential traffic hazards posed by the summer growth of cow parsley at Mentmore crossroads. It was in many respects a typical Parish Council meeting - similar to thousands of others conducted monthly across England. What made it memorable, to me, was the presence of a quietly supportive, and well-informed clerk, who clearly identified with her parish and community. Late in the 1980s, as a new and inexperienced Mentmore Parish councillor, I was also to benefit immensely from Liz's knowledge and experience as clerk to the council. - Corry.

I've only been serving the Parish Council a relatively short time but I can recognise Corry's comments. While Liz has long since stopped being Clerk, she never stopped contributing. Sometimes, without me even realising, she would contribute to my thinking and reassure and correct all at the same time. I could ask her anything and know I'd get a considered and sensible response.

We will miss Liz on the PC but she has agreed to stay on the village hall committee and that is highly reassuring. Again, thank you Liz for all the work you have and continue to do for the community. Mentmore is a better place because of you.

NEWS FROM ST. MARY'S CHURCH



Greetings to everyone,

After nearly a year since the first lockdown started, we have all heard the phrase 'new normal' several times by now, and it might feel like a cliché already. However, one of the things that has been made crystal clear over the last year is that this pandemic and its variants are not an

isolated problem that can quickly be forgotten when it is over but are instead part of a longer-term global, ecological, economic and demographic challenge that humanity, as a whole, faces in the coming decades. It would be a drastic and irresponsible oversimplification to think that there was merely one problem (pandemic) and one solution (vaccination) and that was the end of it. We are realizing more and more that the background contexts to several seemingly different problems are intensely connected with one another, which also offers the possibility of several problems being addressed at once with a more involved and carefully worked-out strategy.

I recently read a book by a professor of cognitive science who thinks one of the biggest dangers in our day is precisely the idea that problems can be isolated from each other and a unique solution found for each, not least because overly simplistic solutions potentially have unwanted side effects. He advocates instead the practice of searching for multiple solutions that not only abate the problem in question but also prevent both it and others from resurfacing — a necessary practice if we are to navigate our way through the coming years in the most responsible manner.

By March we will be well into the season of Lent, and it would equally be an oversimplification to see Lent as being all about giving something up or a willpower exercise. While there is an aspect of Lent that does encourage laying some things or habits aside in order to make room for more helpful ones, there are other aspects too. Traditionally it is a period of study and instruction, originally for those preparing for baptism at Easter, and there is an even wider sense in which it involves encouraging new life to flourish in order better to greet the 'new normal' of Eastertide. This newness took quite some re-acclimatization for the first disciples and indeed none of us can say that we fully inhabit it yet. We can however think about what sets of habits are and are not helpful for being able to see the newness of Easter for what it is. Lent challenges us to be aware of how different habits, attitudes, thoughts and deeds are connected to one another and to consider what this realization means in terms of helping life to flourish in its proper environment. As that seems to match up very well with the challenges posed in our present time, let us hope and pray that a well-informed discipline for the future may emerge and bear fruit for us and for all life.

ST MARY'S CHURCHYARD – Caring for God's Acre

Since our last session of work in the churchyard in October 2020, we have not been able to work as a group. The recent weather has also been a significant deterrent. We had been planning to reinstate the bird boxes that had fallen during the storms but it was either too windy or bitterly cold. However, we would now like to restart our working parties. The main purpose is to prevent the ivy and brambles from reclaiming and re-establishing their grip on the area, to tidy up the paths and ground close to the church walls and to clear out any clogged drains.

It is also a time when the wild spring flowers are starting to appear, so we can enjoy their appearance without damaging them. The snowdrops have been particularly amazing this season.

To make our volunteering safe, it will be essential for you to bring your own tools and refreshments. Tasks can be shared but social distancing should enable us to work safely outdoors. It would be advisable to wear a mask to protect those who have yet to receive their vaccination.



Tools that will be useful, include secateurs, lopper, saw, spade, rake, brush and wheel-barrow, and garden gloves that can deal with brambles and keep your hands warm!

So, with the help of Stella's niece, Rose Norton, there are some photos and a potted biography, but more importantly one of the small booklets she wrote about her childhood in Mentmore as a separate post". What Do Local Councils Do?

Your local council has overall responsibility for the wellbeing of your local community. Their work falls into three main categories:

- Delivery of services
- Improve quality of life for residents
- Give communities a democratic voice



Becoming A Local Councillor

As a local councillor you can become a voice for your community and make real change. Councillors are community leaders and represent the interests of the communities they serve. Local councillors have three main responsibilities:

- Decision-making
- Monitoring
- Getting involved locally

Getting Elected

To stand for election to a local council you must:

- be a UK or Commonwealth citizen, a citizen of the Republic of Ireland or a citizen of another Member State of the European Union
- be at least 18 years old
- be an elector of the local council or; in the past 12 months have occupied land or other premises in the area the local council serves (as owner or tenant), work in the area local council serves (as your principal or only place of work), live within three miles of the local council boundary.

Walking Mentmore's Public Footpaths - MEN/3/1 (bridleway), MEN/6/1 - 1 hour These two paths both link Mentmore and Ledburn. I chose to walk both of them as a circular walk, including some unavoidable use of the road. They can of course be walked independently of one another, and starting either end in Mentmore or Ledburn. I walked them on a freezing day in February.




- 1. Starting at the bridleway beginning at the bottom of the hill below the cricket ground, enter the field with the hay barns on your right and walk diagonally across to the far side, aiming for the telegraph pole. I watched a beautiful rusty red kite cruising low here on the day that I walked here. The path is well marked.
- 2. Continue into the next field, keeping to the same line, and cross it. Mud alert! Still on the same line continue, with the drainage ditch on your left. You will then cross a bridge into the next field. Do a dogleg, left and right to walk along the edge of the next field, towards the pylon, keeping the hedgerow and small trees always on your left, and carry on until you meet the Ledburn Wingrave road. Do not be fooled by a 5-bar gate which you will see to the left as you approach. Keep to the right. This section will take you about 15 minutes.
- 3. Go through the gap in the hedge at this point and walk to the right along the road, for about 10 minutes past Well Lane on your left, with the Ledburn Farm buildings ahead. In about a third of a mile, as you reach the main village of Ledburn, you will see a footpath sign to the right.
- 4. Cross the field, aiming for a gap in the woody growth on the far side. Walking straight ahead you will pass through three areas of deciduous plantation, separated by wide grassy areas. Catkins along here were a welcome sign of spring. You will pass under the line of pylons arriving at a sturdy bridge over a ditch. There are a number of warning signs about use of the paths at this point.
- 5. The marked path continues over a ploughed field. On the other side, walk to your right, with the drainage ditch to your left, to the end of the field. A short distance along to the right is another bridge to cross into the trees. Follow the path (spectacularly muddy on the occasion I walked it) which winds through wild woodland. You will pass a fenced off pond at the far end.
- 6. Pass over another bridge into the field. At this point, the official path cuts diagonally across the corner of the field, but this was not marked. Continue once again with the ditch to your right and turn to your right at the end of the field, over a final bridge, walking for a few yards past a pond to a stile on your left. This is the only stile on the walk, and it is easy for dogs to pass through. Note there is often livestock in this field.
- 7. You now find yourself walking gently uphill towards the village of Mentmore, buildings and skeleton trees on the horizon. On this occasion the ice and snowy patches serve to highlight the original medieval ridge and furrow nature of this field. The end of the path is marked by a kissing gate in the far corner, just below the first building as you reach the top of the hill.


