BUCKS HISTORIC CHURCHES RIDE & STRIDE

Ride & Stride is an event like no other! Why not take part this year and find out for yourself what extraordinary things lie quietly behind the churchyard gates and creaking doors of Buckinghamshire's many churches and chapels. The aim of the day is to raise money (by being sponsored for every participating church one visits) for the repair and restoration of churches and chapels of any Christian denomination in Buckinghamshire. Half the money raised goes to the church or chapel of the participant's choice - we hope St. Mary's, Mentmore - and the other half is added to a general fund which is administered by the Bucksinghamshire Historic Churches Trust. Churches are open between 10am and 6pm. Many of the churches that participate provide delicious refreshments for the riders who visit, as well as a friendly face and someone to talk to! VISIT TO RAF HALTON: Halton House (Officers' Mess), the Trenchard Museum and the James McCudden Flight Heritage Centre

On Saturday 28th April, members of Mentmore, Ledburn & Crafton Historical Group, Mentmore Table Tennis Club & Mentmore Book Club made up a party of 25 that visited RAF Halton, exactly nineteen years and two months to the day since members of the Mentmore Society last visited Halton.

This year's visit and itinerary were organised with the help of Trixie Brabner, the archivist and tour coordinator for Halton House and museums.

The day began with a visit to the Trenchard Museum, where the curator, Francis Hanford, gave us a short introductory talk before the group was split into two. Half of us remained at the Trenchard Museum where we were able to check out the many wonderful exhibits and display items, while the other half went across to the James McCudden Flight Heritage Centre. The flight centre houses several working flight simulators, including a D4 Link Trainer manufactured in Aylesbury in 1951. Bill McGrath provided a brief history and demonstrations of the flight simulators – one or two of our party even got to try the simulators out for themselves. After about 45 minutes the groups swapped locations, so that no-one missed out.







Following on from our visit to the museums we went to one of the modern mess halls where we had lunch before being taken, by Trixie, across to Halton House for our guided tour. During the tour we learned of the house's history and gained some insights into the famous Rothchild family and Alfred Freiherr de Rothschild, who had the house built as his country residence, using it in the late 1800's and early 1900s to host some amazing week-long parties and extravagant entertainment for the rich and famous. We learned that Halton's link to the armed forces began back in 1913, when Alfred invited the army to use his land for summer manoeuvres. This link was strengthened at the outbreak of WWI, when he offered the estate to Lord Kitchener for training and during the war years Halton became the main training unit for aircraft mechanics of the Royal Flying Corps. Following Alfred's death the estate was sold, in 1919, to the War Office/RAF for £112,000 - who knows what it is worth now in 2018! The estate is still home to the RAF, whose primary role is to train military and civilian personnel for military operations, while the house's main function now is as the Officers' Mess. It is often hired out for use as a set to the film and TV industry – you may have seen it in such things as Evita, The Queen, The King's Speech, Poirot, Endeavour and Downton Abbey.

Although the house and estate are still owned by the RAF, the future is uncertain, so visits such as this may soon become a thing of the past!

If you would like to visit Halton House & Museums the next event day is The Heritage Open Day on **Sunday September 16th 2018** (see the Diary Page item).

This type of visit provides something for everyone; children would enjoy the interactive nature of the museums and the grounds of the house on a warm day.

WILDLIFE NEWS



It's been a really funny year so far, with unseasonal weather at unexpected times of the year affecting many of our local wildlife species. However, it is finally beginning to look as though most of them are now back on track and making the most of the warmer and dryer conditions.

As a BORG volunteer I am now spending my time monitoring our boxes for occupants and signs of breeding. The year got off to a slow start with many of our Tawny Owls failing to breed, or having only small clutches. However, despite a late start, we are finally beginning to find Barn Owls on eggs, or in a few cases very small chicks, so fingers crossed for a successful outcome later in the year when we return to try and ring the chicks before they depart the nest.



It has been a delight to see an increase, albeit be it small, in the number of hares around the parish – something I hope will continue as weather, food and control of hare coursing improves. Game birds are also plentiful, with several parishioners having their own "tame" birds, mostly red-legged partridge and pheasants, coming into their gardens on a regular basis for their daily feed.

This year for the first time Steve and I have seen large red and southern damselflies emerging from our garden pond. An amazing thing to see, although one does need a couple of hours to spare if you want to watch the emergence from beginning to end! In the past we have been able to watch the same event for the larger dragonflies, but this year we have seen not a single one emerging from our pond – we have yet to determine why!









Still on the subject of damselflies, we had another first yesterday while out for an afternoon walk in the parish – several pairs of banded demoiselles. The colours of this species are absolutely amazing; the male being a deep, metallic blue with banded wings, while the female is a vibrant, deep green and no banding on the wings.

We will continue to watch and enjoy the local wildlife and hope that you too get the chance to see these, and many other, fantastic species. If you want to share your experiences with others please do get in touch and we will publish your observations in the next newsletter.

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
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25TH ANNIVERSARY PRIZE CROSSWORD
