COLLECTIVE SWITCHING SCHEME - SAVINGS OPPORTUNITY FOR HOUSEHOLDS

This December, Buckinghamshire County Council will again invite residents to see if they can make savings on their energy bills through the <u>Government's Collective Switching Scheme</u> and we need your help to spread the message.

It is a national scheme, which will join our residents, families and friends with other people from around the country in a large pool and then invite energy suppliers to bid in an auction to provide energy to this pool of people at a preferential lower rate. Once the supplier has been confirmed they will write to everyone with a personalised quote. There is no obligation to switch.

Bucks County Council have a website www.buckscc.gov.uk/switchedon where people can find out more and also register their interest. Households can start registering for the auction on the 6th of December 2016 and the deadline for registration is 13rd February 2017. The auction for suppliers will take place on 14th February 2017. Please note that residents will need their existing energy bill(s) to complete your registration.

WALKING THE PARISH FOOTPATHS: MEN/4/1, SLA/17/1

The path starts at Ledburn junction, opposite Cornflower Cottage. There is a green footpath sign and a walkers' access through the gate which brings you onto a wide track. The track runs through farmland on either side, at an angle to the line of pylons, visible some distance away to the right. As you go forward, you pass intermittent hedging and some young oak trees on your left. The view across open farmland to your right is uninterrupted. The track slopes gently uphill and continues round the edge of a large field.

Where it veers slightly to the right, you will see a way-marking post in front of you which directs you across the field when it would be so much easier to use the track. You are not mistaken. Rather than skirt the field, walk straight across it in the direction you are going. The field is on a rise and, if recently ploughed, the way ahead may not be obvious, but have faith! Continue to walk over the rise and you will soon see a second way-marking sign post on the far side of the field. Aim for that. The railway line runs across in front of you. If you are accompanied by a dog, be assured that there is a fence which prevents any access to the line. Turn right at the post and walk along the edge of the field, parallel to the railway line. After a short distance, the path continues rather improbably between two rows of rough hedging, bringing you out at the railway bridge after about 200 yards.

From this point, you are in Slapton Parish (footpath SLA/17/1). The final short section takes you through Network Rail property, and a blue barrier style gate (you can exit to the left of it), to the B488 road which links Ivinghoe and the Leighton Buzzard bypass. The footpath sign indicates back the way you have come. Retrace your steps to return to Ledburn. The whole walk will take about three quarters of an hour in all.

- Wrap turkey carcass in old newspaper and put straight in the food waste bin

MENTMORE ARTS FESTIVAL



The success of the Mentmore Arts Festival continued with a 20% increase in sales and a 22% increase in profits in 2016. The Committee were delighted to announce that they donated a total of £9,000 to worthy causes this year.

Allocated as follows in 2016: £5,000 to the Rennie Grove Hospice Care

£1,500 to Medical Detection Dogs £2,250 to Mentmore Church £ 250 to Mentmore Village Hall

The income for 2016 was £11,806 compared to 2015 of £12,566 and 2014 of £10,562.16. Since the first Arts Festival in 2008 we have given a total of over £50,000 in donations to Charity and Village causes to date.

We had some fabulous new art and artists and also the hugely successful craft sales of popular items such as earrings, necklaces and ornaments. The church and hall were packed to the rafters with no space untaken.

The preview evening was a huge success, although the sales on the preview evening amounted to some £2,325 which was lower than in 2015 at £3,528. It must be noted that in 2015 there was one major purchase of nearly £1,000 which of course helped the figure. However, it was still a great evening with many visitors coming from far and wide. The increase in the bar takings was evident as visitors had to pay for their drink which will be the norm for the future.

I would like to thank the committee for all their hard work and commitment shown in this year's event. My thanks also go to the people who put up posters around all the villages, which we all agree push the festival really hard and puts us on the map! We perhaps need a dedicated person to do this for next year with more posters going to a wider audience and that dedicated person with help must also take them down soon after the festival. It may also be a better idea to make the posters more simple and less cluttered.

We have a great website with updated pictures and a good Facebook page. We know that social media, including Twitter, is a good platform for getting our message out. We thank Mark Smiddy for his time and efforts on the website.

At the end of this year's Festival two committee members, Lorie and Nigel, retired and we would like to thank them for their unstinting support and work over the many successful years.

I am looking forward to our festival in May 2017 and once again am grateful for all the support, loyalty, and friendship the committee has given me which naturally makes for a fun, competitive and social weekend of the festival.

The Mentmore Arts Festival is becoming widely known and promotes art both locally and from afar – the artists are coming from much further afield and Mentmore is becoming known for its Arts Festival annually and we hope it will continue for many years to come. Whilst saying this I would like to thank all the villagers of Mentmore for their patience and support at our festival not just in buying raffle tickets, art but just by being tolerant of all our visitors. Our thanks also must go to the Village Hall Committee and especially Jonathan Langley who we rely on very heavily during the weekend and to whom we are truly grateful.

Now onto my vice chair – Caroline Gates who not only acts as my rock but also organises all the catering and bar and without those elements the festival would be nearly £3,000 down on turnover and the poorer in other areas too. Thank you Caroline.

Finally, our thanks to Gill Rowell, the vicar for allowing us the use of St Marys the Virgin Church.

Bucks Owl and Raptor Group - BORG

As those who read my article in the summer newsletter will already know it has been a reasonably successful year for owls in our area this year – far better than last year. By the end of the breeding season we had ringed a total of 28 birds, 21 of which were owls.

Really great news this year was the finding of a three year old, female barn owl with five healthy chicks nesting in one of our oldest boxes. The female had already been ringed in Stanbridge in the summer of 2014. Four of the five chicks were ringed, but the smallest was too small and unfortunately, due to personal circumstances, we were unable to return to ring the smallest member of the family. We had two other successful barn owl broods this year. The first of these used another of our older boxes and we successfully ringed the adult female and three chicks. Unfortunately, the other pair of adults used a home-made box which does not have an integral inspection door so, although we know it was used to successfully raise a family, we were unable to either ring the birds or determine exactly how many chicks were reared.

Tawny owls also had a good year within our parish, with three of our boxes providing homes for breeding adults. Each of the sites successfully fledged two chicks – a total of six, all of which were ringed. Unfortunately, one pair chose to use a box that was severely damaged, but luckily this did not interfere with the raising of their family. We have now removed the remains of the old box and erected a new box in its place in readiness for next season, when hopefully the adults will return. In fact, as many of you will have heard, the tawny owls are already calling in the surrounding woods, setting up territories, confirming their mates and finding new homes in readiness for next year's breeding season.

Little owls returned and successfully reared a family of three youngsters in the same barn owl box as in the previous two years and, during the late summer, I was lucky enough to spend three weeks in a specially built hide photographing the antics of the family as the chicks grew to independence. Our second family of little owls took up residence in another barn owl box, this one in Edlesborough, and they too reared three youngsters. It seems the local little owls prefer the larger dimensions of a barn owl box to those designed specifically for them!

The breeding season is now over, but Lynne and I will no doubt be out and about during the winter months checking on the boxes and making sure that they are ready for next year's breeding season. If you know you have owls in your area, are interested in having a box on your land and would like some advice please feel free to contact me.

Latest News: A short-eared owl was sighted in mid-November in the fields to the rear of Mentmore Courts.
